## **Call to Order**

• Chairmen DeProfio called the meeting of the Hampton Roads Regional Jail Authority to order, on the 19<sup>th</sup> day of May at 1:30 p.m. via Virtual Zoom.

## Opening

• Chairmen DeProfio opened the meeting and welcomed everyone.

## Approval of Minutes

• Chairmen DeProfio asked for a motion for the Board to approve the minutes from the April 21, 2021, meeting. Sheriff Morgan moved to approve the minutes and Bob Geis seconded; a roll call vote was taken per the virtual meeting instructions; the motion carried.

## **Treasurer's Report**

- Deborah Hand Reported that medical, Keefe, and special revenue are up. Everything else is down compared to last year at this time. Expenditures and uses are coming in under budget. As part of the 2021 capital improvement plan there is an item on the list that was for the replacement of the dental chair in the amount of \$37,000. The dental chair is not being replaced but instead a panoramic x-ray machine would be purchased. The cost of the x-ray machine is \$32,803. The Board is being asked to approve reclassification of the item from the dental chair to the dental x-ray machine and approve the appropriation from the capital reserve fund.
- Chairman DeProfio asked if the money has been appropriated.
- Deborah Hand confirmed the money has been appropriated since last years budget when it was approved but the transfer hadn't been completed yet.
- Chairman DeProfio confirmed the request is to authorize the purchase of the x-ray machine versus the dental chair.
- Sheriff Morgan moved to approve the purchase of the panoramic x-ray machine. Sharon Scott seconded; a roll call vote was taken per the virtual meeting instructions; the motion carried.

#### **Review of Operations and Activities**

#### **Medical**

- Pam Westbrook Reported that during the month of April there were 34 Patients (hereafter Pts) receiving HIV medication. There were two temporary detainment orders (hereafter TDOs). There were three pregnant females and none of them received opiate replacement. There are no Pts receiving outpatient treatment for cancer. There are three Pts over the age of 65, there are two special needs who are paraplegics, and six Pts who are receiving dialysis. For the month of April, there were no positive COVID-19 Pts. The vaccine has been offered to the staff and inmates. For the month of May, there are three Pts that are going out for upcoming surgeries.
- Sheriff Morgan Asked the name of the dentist who is serving this facility.
- Pam Westbrook Answered that our dentist is Dr. Skrba.

#### **Security**

Capt. Bhagirath – Reported Housing Unit 2 remains secure and vacant. Housing Unit 3, which has six pods, pod five is secure and vacant. There are 18 posts manned daily. There are Sergeants assigned as the Housing Unit Managers who are responsible for the daily operations, daily communications with staff and are onsite within the Housing Unit. This will allow them to have consistency with the managers. There was 1 positive COVID-19 patient which was non-systematic. He reported there are seven new hires that have been deployed to the teams as of today.

### Human Resources

 April Brumley – Reported for the month of May, seven new jail officers were hired. Currently, there are 12 officer candidates in the pipeline for a June 21<sup>st</sup> start date. Two Master Control Operators have been hired and one Executive Assistant to start May 24<sup>th</sup>. She reported there was a total of five separations as of May 19<sup>th</sup>. One was due to personal resignations, two immediate resignations, and one administrative separation. For the month of April, there was a total of nine separations.

- Sheriff Morgan– Asked how many of the separations were due to worrying about the pending closure.
- April Brumley Answered most of the immediate resignations were due to the stress of the job and the personal resignations have obtained employment at other agencies. She reported that she has not received any resignations as of yet regarding the possible closure of the facility.
- Sheriff Morgan Stated it would stand to reason that those who have gone to another facility could be due to the undercity.
- April Brumley Stated that is correct.
- Bob Geis Asked if we are still negative going month to month. He also asked to confirm there were nine resignations and seven new hires.
- April Brumley Confirmed those are the correct number of resignations and new hires.

#### Maintenance Projects

• Capt. Mack – Reported that 387 transportation runs were completed, 88 new intakes and 125 releases, 155 video court hearings were conducted, and 964 inmates were seen by the medical department. He reported the department has completed 374 out of 379 work orders. Five remain open pending parts or repairs. Three new fan motors, two hot water valves and three control boards have been replaced.

#### Mental Health Grant

Bruce Hurdle – Reported that for the month of April the CORE Program has received 36 referrals and 32 were accepted. Seven inmates received program services upon being released, three appeared at their first CSB appointment and two appeared at their second appointment. He reported no programs are being provided in the jail at this time but this will be looked at to start in the next coming weeks. Lastly, he reported clients who have been sent back to their local CSB, the grant has allowed us to continue services to clients within 45 days of release.

#### Superintendent Report

Col. Vergakis - Reported that Hampton Roads Regional Jail (HRRJ) is accepting inmates and have one inmate that is COVID positive. We continue to consolidate the pods and have seven of our 16 pods closed. This has reduced the mandatory post significantly. The medical contract was reviewed by staff along with Rick Morse. The draft was sent to Jeff Rosen for review, and he is currently finalizing the draft to send back to Wellpath. It's expected the draft will return by end of this week or first part of next week. The preventative maintenance contract went out for award and Colonial Web, who currently holds the contract, won that award again. Out of the committee of five, Colonial Web was ranked the highest. Ms. Hand reduced the contract rate for the first two years. The rate for the first year was reduced \$40,000 and the second and subsequent years will increase by three percent. A risk management grant was received from the insurance company and the award is \$4,000. This grant money will go towards items or equipment to reduce workers compensation. He reported that we continue to work with the ICC Committee to reduce those with Serious Mental Illness (SMI) in restricted housing. The goal is to remove them from restricted housing before their 30<sup>th</sup> day. In regard to retention, during this month there were celebrations for Correctional Officer Week and Nurse's week. For Correctional Officer Week, the Chaplin was able to work with the local churches to provide donations and a food truck for

the security staff. Cake and other items were gifted as well. For Administrative Professional's Day, an ice cream social was held. The Medical Department is celebrating Nurse's week and HRRJ will be providing them breakfast on Friday. Leadership development will continue. Books have been given out and Col. Anderson is taking the lead on this development and the first Zoom meeting with sergeants and lieutenants has occurred. He also reported about the positive changes he's been seeing across the Board. The leadership in the jail is making a big difference, DOJ agreement is being followed and is helping with navigation.

- Sheriff Morgan Asked how the Board can assist with the process of moving the SMI patients out of restricted housing so the facility can achieve greater success.
- Col. Vergakis Answered saying internal changes needed to be made but the Board will be able to help during discussion in closed session.
- Sheriff Morgan Thanked Col. Vergakis and the staff for working with Newport News Sheriff Office during facility repairs. More than 60 inmates needed to be moved out and HRRJ has been assisting with ensuring these patients are moved and properly cared for.
- Col. Vergakis Stated we accepted 10 inmates today.
- Sharon Scott Asked the percentage of inmates who are SMI.
- Col. Vergakis Answered with 34.9 percent.

• Alan Archer read the motion to go into closed session. Sheriff Morgan seconded; a roll call vote was taken per the virtual meeting instructions; the motion carried.

- Alan Archer read the motion to reconvene in open session. Sharon Scott seconded; a roll call vote was taken per the virtual meeting instructions; the motion carried.
- Brian DeProfio Announced the establishment of a committee of the member City Mangers to work on reimagining the Hampton Roads Regional Jail.
