Chair report:

Kate Ayers

- The Board allocated time to preparing the report
- Executive committee met in September
- The Governor is not able to meet with us to receive the report.
- Kate had reached out in september, she thinks maybe we need to start reaching out earlier or strengthen our relationship with his office
- Some of the other Advsiroy Boards got meetings with governor
- Eric mentioned that Chief Brown and Micheal Perez could help us get meetings with the Governor
- Eric also reminded that we will send the report to the General Assembly and that we had discussed getting a briefing to share it with legistlators as well
- Opportunity to reach our to legislators: there will be some new legislators who may be interested in learning more about issues, due to re-distribution and new zonings
 - Reach out and introduce ourselves, create relationships for the next year
 - Not enough time to focus on this year's report, but these issues can be addressed in the next years
 - \circ Reaching out to each of our legislators could be a way to do this

- Aas long as only 2 Board members presnet, it will not be considered a meeting following FOIA
- Karina highlighted some of the barriers she sees with Spanish speaking population in Richmond:
 - Language barieers
 - Limited information about SBA, certification processes, regulatory processes, process to receive funding

International business symposium/ Global Economic Summit

- Eric shared a background of how this work was done in the past and with the help of existing Advisory Boards
 - Opportuity to bring counselor trade officials from different countries
 - Integrating international trade from different countries who wanted to invest in the US and at the same time looking into exporting to those countries
- Department of Minority Enterprise backed this effort up in the past
- The symposium was very well attended (300 businesses)
 - focused on SWAM certification
- Possibility now: revisiting that work and incorporating new factors in it
 - Small business development
 - Entreprenerur opportunities
 - workforce development
 - Department of labor
- Challenge: those New Americans who can contribute to these efforts do not have much information about regulations
 - *the workforce development lens helps highlight the contributions of new americans and also advocate for some of the resources (language access, english acquisition, access to services, etc) New Americans need
- This could be a 2 year plan and requires support from a state department or an entity that can make actions happen
- VAB and VLAB are the other Advisory Boards that can help with this efforts
- these boards have direct connections to the governor
- Andrei could also help facilitate connections with the governor
- Eric will write something and have it ready for the next meeting
- Those working on this effort need to be here longer than until next june




Becoming a Certified Welcoming City

Certified Welcoming is a formal designation for cities and counties.

The program assesses city and county governments on their efforts to include and welcome immigrants in all areas of civic, social, and economic life in their communities.

With a Certified Welcoming designation, communities distinguish their local efforts, build a competitive advantage, and gain access to opportunities to share their welcoming practices on a regional, national, and global stage.



Becoming a Certified Welcoming City: Welcoming Standards

The Welcoming Standard is organized according to our seven framework categories:



Government and Community Leadership





Civic Leadership

Equitable Access



Education



Economic Development



Connected Communities



Safe Communitites

Becoming a Certified Welcoming City: Process and Timeline

The certification process typically takes six months to one year.

- Local governments are the lead applicant.
- Partners contribute to the process at any stage, including completing the application, contributing to the selfassessment, and being consultants during the site visit.

Certificates are valid for four years.
