The Virginia Highlands Community College Board convened at 12:00 p.m. on Tuesday, February 4, 2025. Lunch was at noon, and the business portion of the meeting immediately followed at 1:00 p.m. in the ADM Boardroom.

Call to Order

Don Bowman, Chair, called the meeting to order.

Approval of Minutes

Board Member Dan Smith made the motion to approve the minutes for November 12, 2024 Minutes No. 336. Board Member Gwen Beattie seconded, Board Member Beth Rhinehart abstained due to not being present at this meeting, and the motion carried with remainder of the Board in favor.

Public Comments

There were no public comments.

College Updates

Department Highlight

Dr. Adam Hutchison mentioned we once again invited guests today as a "Department Highlight" of our campus. Faculty members Donnie Melvin and Erick Farris presented details of their Electrical Technology Program.

Instruction and Student Services

Dr. Derek Whisman, Vice President of Instruction and Student Services, began his address to the Board by asking for approval of several program changes effective Fall 2025:

- New Career Studies Certificate (CSC) in Victim Advocacy Assistant
- Discontinue Associate of Applied Science (AAS) in Human Services
- Discontinue Certificate in Human Services Advocate
- New Associate of Science (AS) in Social Sciences, Major in Social Work
- Discontinue CSC in Industrial Electricity

The details were in the packet that was handed out today. All of these proposals have been reviewed and approved by our Curricula and Programs Committee and Dr. Whisman.

The first program change proposal is a new CSC in Victim Advocacy Assistant. This one-year program would prepare students for entry level work as victim advocates in the criminal justice system and community organizations. Letters of support from community agency representatives were included. Board Member Dan Smith made a motion to approve the new CSC in Victim Advocacy Assistant. Board Member Tonya Triplett seconded, and the motion carried with all in favor.

The next proposal that Dr. Whisman presented is discontinuing the Certificate in Human Services Advocate and the AAS Degree in Human Services. These would be replaced with an AS Degree in Social Sciences, Major in Social Work. This new degree is fully transferable to all Transfer VA partners and better aligns with students' needs. Board Member Pam Hill made a motion to discontinue the Certificate in Human Services Advocate and the AAS Degree in Human Services, and replace with the AS in Social Sciences, Major in Social Work. Board Member Don Ashley seconded, and the motion carried with all in favor.

The last proposal is discontinuing the Industrial Electricity CSC. This was created nine years ago for a specific employer that is no longer needed, and the course layout is now considered confusing and out of sequence. Furthermore, there are five other electrical technician certificates students can pursue which are much more relevant. Board Member Gwen Beattie made a motion to approve the new CSC in Victim Advocacy Assistant. Board Member Beth Rhinehart seconded, and the motion carried with all in favor.

Dr. Whisman also provided an enrollment update. For Spring semester, our most accurate numbers as of today indicate we have an increase of 80 FTE compared to this time last year. Dr. Whisman reports that we expect enrollment to grow as the Washington County Promise Program begins this Fall semester.

Institutional Advancement and Educational Foundation

Vice President Laura Pennington provided updates in her division. The ribbon cutting for the Paramont Advanced Technology Workforce Center (PATWC) will be held on March 19. The Holiday Meal Boxes for students were a success and provided meals for 116 families during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. Ms. Pennington also shared that last week, she and Dr. Hutchison once again took three students to Richmond for the Southwest Virginia Legislative Reception and VHCC Day at the Capitol.

Finance and Administrative Services

Christine Fields, Vice President of Finance and Administration, gave a few brief updates of active campus projects. We have \$1 million in renovations dedicated to our Nursing Simulation Lab with an estimated start date in the Summer. The exterior doors project and electrical work of the patio will also begin soon. The Master Plan is still underway, and SFCS team is coming to campus the week of February 17 to talk with different groups.

President's Office

Dr. Hutchison began by asking the Board for approval for three Professor Emeritus nominations this year: Jim Kroll, Mary Munsey, and Melba Bolling. This process is a special way to honor retired faculty and staff that were long time employees with excellent service to the College. The three nominations have already been reviewed and approved by Human Resources, the ad hoc committee, and Dr. Hutchison. They will now need Board approval. Board Member Pam Hill made a motion to approve the Professor Emeritus nominations for these three individuals. Board Member Beth Rhinehart seconded, and the motion carried with all in favor.

Dr. Hutchison also informed the Board that the State Board for Community Colleges will have their next meeting here in Abingdon on March 19-20. Chancellor Doré and his staff will also be here. There are a couple of events incorporated in this visit, one of which is the ribbon cutting for the PATWC. Dr. Hutchison, along with individuals from Southwest Virginia Community College and Mountain Empire Community College, will be at their Board Meeting on March 20 to discuss the healthcare industry in our region. Dr. Hutchison mentioned to be on the lookout for invitations and further details.

Lastly, while he was in Richmond last week for the legislative sessions, Dr. Hutchison shared that there is some legislation around dual enrollment which possibly could allow us to offer more dual enrollment classes to more students at a lower cost. If the legislation passes, it will affect some behind the scenes processes.

These are preliminary numbers. We urge caution in their interpretation.

Current term data shown in this report come from SIS Query as of the morning the report was run. Prior year data come from SAS data files built the previous year, also from SIS. Only credit enrollments are included. Audit enrollments are excluded.

• Resource Development/Fund Raising:

Advanced Technology Center Capital Project

The official ribbon cutting took place on March 19th while the VCCS State Board was in Abingdon for their regular quarterly board meeting. A lease is in place between the College and the Foundation for the period during which the Foundation maintains ownership of the building, and the College is delivering programs and services in the building. We continue to work with Burwil on a final punch-list.

Foundation Scholarships and Student Support

- The scholarship application cycle for the 2025-26 academic year will close on May 15, 2025. This application cycle is one of the main entry points for students to access scholarship funds from: the VHCC Foundation, the Tobacco Commission, Smyth Promise, Washington Promise, and third-party sponsorships.
- Student emergency funding continues to be a critical safety net for VHCC students for things like books/access codes, uniforms, testing fees, utilities, rent, and food. Additional support is provided through the Phil Station Food Depot, the College Express transportation program, and other efforts. The sponsorship campaign is ongoing for the Phil Station in particular (after a successful \$2700.00 Giving Tuesday event).

Other Highlights

- The Foundation and the College recognized the Wellspring Foundation at the *Chancellor's Leadership in Philanthropy* luncheon in Richmond. VHCC's sister colleges and the VCCS also celebrated the leadership, support, and engagement of 23 other honorees.
- The Foundation pilot-tested the use of a web-based point of sale and fundraising/event tool with the VHCC Greenhouse's recent spring plant sale during *Garden Faire*. With some adjustments, the Foundation should be able to support additional student/program fundraisers going forward.
- At the Foundation board's April meeting, First Bank & Trust was on hand to facilitate an initial workshop to help the board plan for financial management and investment as it moves past the period of time that it was focused on the Paramont Center.
- · More than \$7,500 has been raised to support the VHCC Arts Array Program from partners.
- · Search for a full-time Advancement and Marketing Specialist is in process.

Campus Improvement Projects – Status Update

Please find below an update on current campus improvement initiatives, including timelines, funding sources, and project statuses:

Ongoing Campus Improvement Projects

1. Patio Renovation - Phases I & II

- Status: In Progress
- Details: Design is complete. Construction contract has been issued to include new pergolas, lighting enhancements, and upgraded electrical infrastructure. Electrical work is scheduled for completion by mid-May 2025. Pergola installation is pending approval from VCCS and the Division of Engineering and Buildings.
- Funding: Special Projects (State Funds)
- Estimated Cost: \$500,000 (includes design, renovation, furnishings, and equipment)

2. Comprehensive Campus Master Plan

- Status: In Progress
- Details: SFCS is actively collecting existing as-builts and conducting a full facility assessment, including mechanical, electrical, and plumbing (MEP) systems.
- Funding: State Funds
- o Estimated Cost: \$310,000

3. VCCS Maintenance Reserve Projects

- Status: In Progress
- Components:
 - a. *Exterior Door Replacement:* Six campus buildings will receive new exterior doors. Work begins late May 2025 with completion expected by August.
 - b. Asbestos Abatement: Final plans approved by VCCS. Notice to proceed issued. Work on ISC, MEC, and NEB buildings starts late May/early June.
 - c. *OTC HVAC Replacement:* Redesign of existing 2-pipe system to a more efficient 4-pipe system is underway. Anticipated start: Spring/Summer 2026.
 - d. *ADA Restroom Renovations:* Planning phase underway to modernize restrooms in ADM, ISC, MEC, OTC, and NEB.

4. Nursing Simulation Lab Renovation (Workforce Pipeline Capital Funds)

Status: In Progress

- Details: A&E is finalizing construction documents for VCCS submission.
- Anticipated Start: Spring/Summer 2026
- o Estimated Cost: \$1.1 million

5. ISC Lighting & Ceiling Tile Upgrades

- o Status: In Progress
- Details: Complete building-wide upgrade to energy-efficient LED lighting and new ceiling tiles.
- Start Date: June 2025
 Funding: State Funds
 Estimated Cost: \$300,000

6. LRC Facility - Pre-Planning Phase

- Status: In Progress
- Details: SFCS has been asked to include this initiative in its Master Plan scope to assess renovation feasibility and develop conceptual designs.
- Funding: State FundsEstimated Cost: \$250,000
- 7. **NEB Facility Pre-Planning Phase**
 - o Status: In Progress
 - Details: Coordination with VCCS is underway to select A&E professionals for a feasibility study on renovating and expanding the NEB building.
 - Funding: State FundsEstimated Cost: \$250,000

8. ISC Science Lab Renovation Feasibility Study

- Status: In Progress
- Details: Identifying qualified A&E firm to assess and redesign four science labs in ISC.
- Funding: State FundsEstimated Cost: \$250,000

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Small Business Development Center (SBDC)

Cindy Fields

The Virginia Highlands SBDC serves the City of Bristol, Virginia, as well as Smyth and Washington Counties. The mission of the Small Business Centers is to provide one-on-one mentoring using a feet on the street approach for small businesses and to provide training and financial assistance to help grow the local economies.

In 2024, the VHCC SBDC provided 19 trainings to 250 businesses, directly counseled 187 businesses (170 percent of goal) in excess of 750 direct counseling hours and worked with 48 long-term clients. The outcome of the work of the center produced 18 confirmed new businesses, capital investment (through loans, owner equity and grants) of \$3,856,569, and documented sales increases of \$3,748,680 over the prior year.

The center participated in three business challenges in the service area and collaborates with many local eco-system partners to encourage entrepreneurship in the area. The top three types of business sectors served were Food Service, Retail Trade and Construction, which represented 52 percent of the total clients served.
